

DIVINE MERCY

On April 30, 2000, Pope John Paul II announced the canonization of Sister Maria Faustina Kowalska and, soon after, decreed that, "throughout the world the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday." The primary celebration on this day is, as always, the Second Sunday of Easter, but within that, today's reading from the book of John tells us of the institution of the sacrament of Reconciliation. How appropriate it is that we should celebrate God's abundant mercy on this day!

In an address from the Shrine of Divine Mercy in Poland on June 7, 1997, Pope John Paul II gave the following reflections on this devotion to Divine Mercy: "There is nothing that man needs more than Divine Mercy—that love which is benevolent, which is compassionate, which raises man above His weakness to the infinite heights of the holiness of God.

"In this place we become particularly aware of this. From here, in fact, went out the Message of Divine Mercy that Christ Himself chose to pass on to our generation through Faustina. And it is a message that is clear and understandable for everyone. Anyone can come here, look at this image of the merciful Jesus, His Heart radiating grace, and hear in the depths of his own soul what Faustina heard: 'Fear nothing. I am with you always.' (from her diary, 586)

"The Church re-reads the message of mercy in order to bring with greater effectiveness to this generation at the end of the millennium, and to future generations, the light of hope.

"At no time and in no historical period—especially at a moment as critical as our own—can the Church forget the prayer that is a cry for the mercy of God amid the many forms of evil which weigh upon humanity and threaten it. "The more the human conscience succumbs to secularization, loses its sense of the very meaning of the word "mercy," moves away from God, and distances itself from the mystery of mercy, the more the Church has the right and the duty to appeal to the God of mercy with loud cries."

I pray unceasingly that God will have mercy on us and the whole world."
