

STEWARDSHIP

Parents, please take some time to consider your own attitudes about stewardship. Are you involved in ministry within the Church? Are you involved in other types of service in your community? Do you willingly help others in need? Do you consider the time, talents, and material things you have to be gifts from God or fruits of your own labor? Do you give to the Sunday collection on a regular basis? Do you give money to missions and other out-of-parish needs? Do your children see you doing these things?

You may be wondering what the last question on this list has to do with the others. Just this: giving of self is a highly personal commitment. Yet we, as parents, are constantly communicating what is important in our lives to our ever-watchful little ones. If your children see you paying a large cable TV bill each month, but only putting pocket change into the Sunday collection, they will naturally see where your priorities lie. Likewise, if you are not giving of your lives in service to others, they will conclude that "someone else" should do it.

The way we live out this call to stewardship is unique in each of our lives. There are some things, however, that we all have in common:

- 1. We have all been given gifts of time, talent, and treasure.
- 2. Everything we have is a gift from God, and nothing in our lives is totally, exclusively our own (except our sins). God wants to be the Lord of all areas of our lives. How we work and play, how we treat our bodies and the earth, where our money goes, our relationships with others, and all our thoughts and words are part of this relationship we have with God. Gratitude is our natural response to God's incredible generosity.
- 3. When we see how the Lord is constantly caring for all our needs, the next mature step is to share what we have received with others.
- 4. As with all areas of our lives as Christians, that of stewardship is constantly changing and growing in response to the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives.
