“Perfect, Peter!” Mr. Pauline told his son. “Heaven is God’s loving reward for leading a good life.”

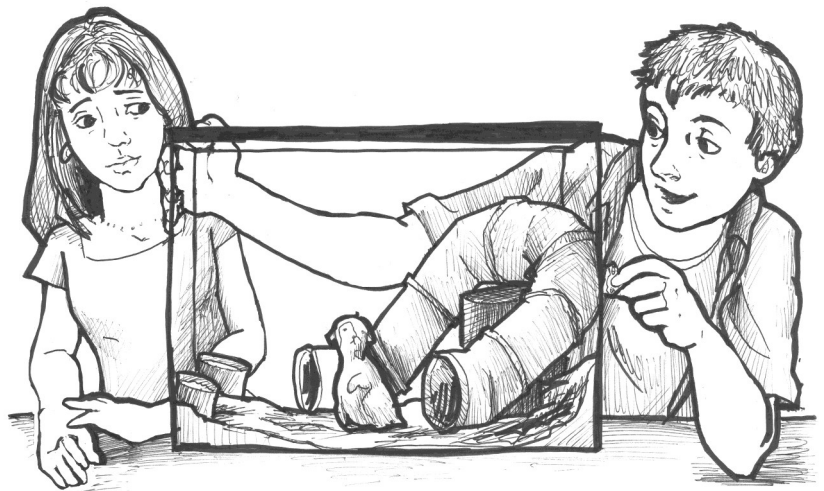
“And Holy, the hamster, can show us how!” Vincent shouted as he leaped up.
